International Women's Day (IWD) is celebrated on March 8 every year. It is a focal point in the movement for women's rights. After the Socialist Party of America organized a Women's Day on February 28, 1909, in New York, the 1910 International Socialist Woman's Conference suggested a Women's Day be held annually. After women gained suffrage in Soviet Russia in 1917, March 8 became a national holiday there. The day was then predominantly celebrated by the socialist movement and communist countries until it was adopted in 1975 by the United Nations.

In the early 1900s, working conditions for women were harsh. They worked long hours with low pay and had no voting rights. On February 28, 1909, in New York City, the Socialist Party of America organized the first National Woman's Day to bring attention to these issues. More than 15,000 women marched through the streets of New York, demanding shorter work hours, better pay, and voting rights.

The following year, at the International Conference of Working Women in Copenhagen, Denmark, Clara Zetkin, a German politician and advocate for women's rights, proposed that March 8th be established as an annual Women's Day. Her proposal was met with unanimous approval from the over 100 women representing 17 different countries.

The first official International Women's Day was celebrated on March 19, 1911. More than one million men and women attended rallies and demonstrations around the world, campaigning for women's right to vote, work, and hold public office. In 1913, the date was changed to March 8th, and it has been celebrated on that day ever since.

During World War I, International Women's Day became a way for women to protest against the war and advocate for peace. In Russia, on March 8, 1917 (which was February 23rd on the Julian calendar used at the time), women textile workers went on strike in Petrograd (now St. Petersburg) to demand bread and an end to the war. Their strike sparked a series of events that led to the abdication of Tsar Nicholas II and the establishment of a provisional government.

After the October Revolution, the Bolsheviks made International Women's Day an official holiday in Soviet Russia. It was celebrated with parades, speeches, and demonstrations, and women were given the day off work. In 1965, the Soviet Union declared March 8th a non-working day to honor women's contributions to society.

International Women's Day continued to be observed in socialist and communist countries throughout the 20th century. In 1975, during International Women's Year, the United Nations officially recognized March 8th as International Women's Day. The UN began celebrating the



day annually, focusing on a different theme each year.

Today, International Women's Day is celebrated around the world. It is a day to recognize and celebrate the achievements of women in all fields, from politics and science to art and sports. It is also a day to raise awareness about gender equality and women's rights issues, such as violence against women, reproductive rights, and equal pay.

Many organizations and individuals mark the day with rallies, marches, and other events. Some countries, including China, Russia, and Vietnam, have made International Women's Day a national holiday. In some places, men give flowers and small gifts to the women in their lives, such as mothers, wives, and daughters.

Each year, International Women's Day has a different theme. Recent themes have included "Make It Happen," "Pledge for Parity," and "Be Bold for Change." The themes are meant to inspire action and highlight specific areas where progress is needed to achieve gender equality.

While much progress has been made since the first International Women's Day in 1911, there is still work to be done. Women around the world continue to face discrimination, violence, and unequal treatment. International Women's Day serves as a reminder of the ongoing struggle for gender equality and a call to action for individuals and organizations to work towards a more just and inclusive society for all.
