Audio Script (Teacher Use)

Chinese New Year does not fall on the same date every year. Some people think it depends on school holidays or the weather, but in fact it follows the Chinese lunar calendar, which is based on the movement of the moon.

In 2026, Chinese New Year begins on February seventeenth. Although last year was The Year of The Snake, This year is known as the Year of the Horse. People born this year are often described as energetic and independent, and they are believed to enjoy freedom and new experiences, although some say they can be impatient.

Food plays an important role during the celebrations. Families often eat dumplings, which symbolise wealth, as their shape looks similar to old Chinese gold coins. Fish is also commonly served, because it represents abundance and the hope of having more than enough in the year ahead.

In 2027, Chinese New Year starts earlier, on February sixth. Although the official public holiday is seven days long, many people are able to take nine days off work, depending on their company.

Traditionally, the celebrations do not really end until the Lantern Festival, which marks the fifteenth day of the first lunar month.
