

Breaking the Ice M Two Truths and a Halloween Lie

- 1. **Preparation:** Each student must come up with **two true statements** and **one false statement** about themselves, all related to Halloween, scary stories, or strange experiences. For example:
 - o "I once dressed up as a vampire for Halloween." (True)
 - o "I love watching horror movies alone at night." (True)
 - "I met a ghost when I was 10 years old." (Lie)
- 2. **Sharing:** One by one, students share their three statements with the class, keeping the order of the truth and lie mixed up.
- 3. **Guessing:** The rest of the class must guess which statement is the lie by discussing together and reasoning their choice.
- 4. **Follow-up:** After revealing the lie, the student can briefly explain their truths, which encourages more conversation and getting to know one another.
